





Virtue of the Month


Faith meaning: Believing in God and all He has revealed.

Saints:

PreK-2: St. Martha Feast day July 29th St. Martha believed in Jesus. She knew He was God and could do anything. When her brother Lazarus died, Martha told Jesus, "If only you had been here, Lord, my brother would not have died." When Jesus asked Martha if she believed in Him, she said yes---and Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead!




Grs. 3-5: St. Jerome Feast day September 30th. St. Jerome was born into a wealthy pagan family and studied in Rome, where he became a lawyer. Because of his great intelligence, St. Jerome came to believe in God in his mind—but not in his heart. After he was baptized, he began to study about God, and it was then that he finally had a true conversion. St. Jerome then lived for years as a hermit in the Holy Land, and people said a lion lived with him. This is why the saint is shown with a lion in most paintings. St. Jerome became so famous for knowing Scripture that the pope asked him to help translate the Bible into Latin so that more people at that time and place could read it.



Grs. 6-8: St. Augustine Feast day August 28th After St. Paul, perhaps one of the most compelling stories of conversion to faith in Christ must be that of St. Augustine. Born of a pagan father, who became a Christian only on his deathbed, and of St. Monica, who was born and raised in the Christian faith, St. Augustine was blessed with great intelligence and burdened with an unruly heart. Although raised in the faith of his mother, St. Augustine was not baptized and drifted away from belief in God to follow the world. By the time he was 15, he was living with a woman outside of marriage, with whom he later had a son. St. Augustine's keen mind led him to the famous academic centers of the pagan Roman Empire, where he taught with great success. Unsettled in his understanding of the meaning of life, St. Augustine followed the philosophy of the Manichaeans for a time, which saw the world as a great struggle between good and evil and life in the body as something to be scorned.

The turning point in the saint's life finally came when, inspired by the mysterious words of a child to "take and read," St. Augustine opened up the Bible and his heart was opened to God. Baptized by St. Ambrose, bishop of Milan, Italy, St. Augustine fought against the heresies of the day—including Manichaeism—and became one of the most prolific writers on the Christian faith the world has ever known. Perhaps the most quoted of his sayings is the one that best describes the profound faith of St. Augustine: "Our hearts were made for You, O Lord, and they are restless until they rest in You."

Isaiah 22:15, 19-23 Matthew 16:13-20

In the first reading from the Old Testament, the prophet Isaiah prepares the people for a change in leadership. Isaiah brings God's message that Eliakim will replace Shebna. God will put great trust in Eliakim and give to him the "key to the House of David." Eliakim will do all things in the name of God. Along with leadership comes responsibility. God chose Eliakim to be a caring leader who treats the people with respect.

In the gospel, Peter professes his faith in Jesus. Jesus asks his friends what they believe about him. Peter replies, "You are the Messiah." For this statement Jesus gives Peter the "keys of the kingdom of heaven," and calls Peter "Rock," the foundation stone upon which Jesus will build his Church.

Peter's faith in Jesus' identity is a gift from God. Peter is given the task of passing on the faith. Jesus entrusts the keys to Peter and God's power is given to the entire community of believers.

Petrine Ministry in the Church

Peter is the foundational leader upon whom Jesus built his Church. Catholics believe that the charge of shepherding the Catholic Church has passed down from Peter to successive holders of the office of bishop of Rome.

The pope is the bishop of Rome and the head of the Roman Catholic Church. Our Church teaches that as pastor of the entire Church, the pope has full, supreme, and universal power over the whole Church. Bishops are successors to the apostles in their role as teachers and pastors. Together with their leader, the pope and never apart from him, they have full authority over the Church.

The pope is a spiritual leader. His leadership is modeled after the Good Shepherd, Christ, who is compassionate and loving. The pope witnesses to Jesus with the help of the Holy Spirit by spreading love, justice, peace, and holiness throughout the world.

Sacrament Connection

The sacrament of Holy Orders celebrates the ordaining of a man as a bishop, a priest, or a deacon, to serve the People of God in the name of Jesus. From the days of the apostles, bishops, priests and deacons have served the Church.
