Virtue of the Month:

Honesty: meaning: being trustworthy and true

Everyone wants to be a man or woman of integrity. To have integrity, we need to let our faith carry through to every part of our lives. When our words match our actions, we are trustworthy and true. The eighth commandment, "You shall not bear false witness", commands us to be honest in all we say and do. Yet a mature person also knows when it is better to say nothing at all: we might sound good, but no one really thinks we're virtuous when we say something unkind followed by, "but it's true!" That actually makes us sound untrustworthy—the opposite of honesty. It shows others that we are saying we are virtuous (telling the truth) while acting out of vice (being mean). This is the opposite of integrity. If you want to be a person of honesty and integrity, the next time you're hesitant to say something, ask yourself these three questions: Is it true? Is it kind? Is it helpful?

Saint of the Month for Preschool to grade 2: Blessed Francesco Marto and Blessed Jacinta Marto. Feast day is February 20



Mary appeared to the children Francesco, Jacinta, and Lucia, but some people thought they were lying. These people told the children to change their story or they would get in trouble, but the children did not give up, because they were telling the truth.

Saint of the Month for grades 3-5: Saint Kateri Tekakwitha. Feast Day is July 14.

Saint Kateri Tekakwitha belonged to a Native American tribe near New York State. Kateri's mother was a Christian but her father was not. When her parents both died and left her an orphan, St. Kateri asked to be baptized and then promised her life to God. Her non-Christian relatives made fun of her belief in God, but St. Kateri remained true to her faith. She journeyed over 200 miles on foot to a Christian settlement of Native Americans and lived the rest of her life there, praying and serving the people. After her death, people prayed to her for help, and miracles were performed through her intercession.



Saint of the Month for Middle School: Saint Athanasius. Feast Day is May 2.



St. Athanasius studied the Greek classics and theology in Alexandria, where he became bishop. He attended the Council of Nicaea in 325 A.D. and defended the faith against the heresy of Arianism, which claimed that Jesus was a mere creature and not truly God. Athanasius taught that Jesus was God the Son, having the same nature as God the Father. This sounds normal to us who profess this in the Creed, but the Council of Nicaea is what added this section to the Apostles Creed, because the issue was hotly debated at the time, and saints like Athanasius realized that the divinity of Christ was an issue of vital importance.

Religious and political leaders

persecuted him for remaining steadfast to this great truth of our faith, sending him into exile five times, for a total of 17 years. Yet he never wavered in remaining faithful to the truth, and we continue to profess the Creed as he taught it, almost 1,700 years later!

Carry this thought in your heart as a guide for your faith journey this week.

Leviticus 13:1-2, 44-46 Mark 1:40-45

In the first reading from the Old Testament we are shown the terrible plight of those suffering from infectious diseases. The priests are instructed to examine anyone suffering from skin diseases. If it is determined that a person is unclean, they are required to live outside the community. This treatment may have been due to fear of the disease spreading. When this Old Testament passage was written, the understanding was that holy people must be physically and morally well.



This gospel deals with the subject of illness and healing. The healing that Jesus performs on the man with leprosy shows that Jesus has come into the world to restore health and bring people back to God. Because leprosy was such a dreadful skin disease, the leper's bold approach to Jesus and Jesus' loving response are all the more meaningful. Jesus is moved with compassion by the sight of the man. Jesus acts, and the man is completely cured. Jesus

urges the man to tell no one of his healing, but the man promptly goes out and tells others the great news—that he is healed.



- What did it mean to be holy in Old Testament times?
- Why does Jesus have compassion for the sick?
- When have you been so excited about something that you had to tell others about the news?

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

Jesus showed great compassion for those who were sick. He helped people believe in the goodness and healing power of God. While he did not heal everyone, his miracles showed the coming of the kingdom of God. The Church continues the healing mission of Jesus by taking care of those who are ill, by praying for them, and by celebrating the sacrament of anointing of the sick.



In the sacrament of the anointing of the sick, the Word of God is proclaimed from sacred Scripture. Then a silent laying on of hands by either a priest or bishop occurs, followed by the offering of the prayer of faith. Then the person who is sick is anointed with holy oil by the priest or bishop while the following words are said: "Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up." The anointing can be made on the forehead and on the palms of the hands. The sacrament can be celebrated in a private home, in a hospital, in a nursing facility, or in a church. Families and parishioners are encouraged to be present to offer the comfort and support of the whole Church.



Sacrament Connection

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick strengthens ones faith and gives those who are seriously ill or dying the grace to face their sickness. Through the Sacrament, the Holy Spirit offers the gifts of courage, hope and peace.

Affording Catholic Education

The Diocese of Lansing awarded more than \$523,000 in scholarships to help families afford Catholic school for the 2020/21 school year.

Many families need and receive financial assistance for Catholic school tuition. Diocese of Lansing Catholic schools believe that a Catholic education should be available, accessible and affordable to any family that wants to provide their children with an authentically Catholic, academically rigorous education.

Our Scholarship program is a need-based assistance program. Need is determined by an independent, third-party service, F.A.C.T.S., which makes its assessment based on income and tax information. However, the FACTS application does have a section that offers the family to list any changes in their financial situation, and these are taken into consideration by the individual schools.

Eligibility Criteria for All Scholarships

- Family must complete a <u>FACTS financial aid application online</u> on or before March 1, 2021.
- Student must show a financial need of at least \$750
- The Student must be Catholic, attend a Diocese of Lansing school, and belong to a parish in the Diocese of Lansing.

Scholarships for the 2021-22 School Year

Diocese of Lansing Grants

- Grades K-8: \$750 per student
- Grades 9-12: \$1000 per student

The Venerable Augustus Tolton Scholarship

• Grades K-12: \$500

The Venerable Augustus Tolton Scholarship is aimed at increasing the number of Catholic African American students in the Diocese of Lansing's Catholic schools. It will operate under the patronage of Venerable Augustus Tolton (1854–97), a former slave who became the first African American priest in the United States. This grant is \$500 per student. In addition to the Grant Criteria for all grants, student must be African-American or Black and show a need of at least \$500.

Applying for Financial Aid

- The deadline for applications is March 1, 2021.
- By completing the FACTS application, you are applying for all grants available through the Diocese of Lansing. No need to complete an application for each grant.
- Applicants can complete the online form by clicking the FACTS link: <u>https://online.factsmgt.com/aid</u>

About the FACTS application: The link will be available December 1, 2020 and **will close March 1, 2021**. After March 1, 2021 please contact your school directly. There is a \$35.00 fee payable to FACTS through their online application process.

Once the FACTS online form has been completed, the following information will need to be submitted to FACTS:

- Copies of your most recent Federal tax forms including all supporting tax schedules and W2's.
- Copies of supporting documentation for Social Security Income, Welfare, Child Support, Food Stamps, Workers' Compensation, and TANF.

All supporting documentation must be uploaded online through the FACTS online form. You will receive a determination letter by May 30th. If you received a grant, your school will be notified and the grant will be sent directly to your school in October of 2021.

- What if my application is submitted after March 1 2021, am I eligible for financial aid?
- You must have your application completed by March 1st and *all required documents* to FACTS by April 1, 2021. Applications received after that date are not eligible for the Diocese of Lansing grants, but you may still be eligible for financial assistance from your school. Contact your school directly for more information.
- Do I have to complete separate applications for my children if they attend different schools?
- No, you submit one application per family. You list each student and the school they attend on one application. The Diocese of Lansing and each school will receive your determination.
- Do I have to complete separate applications for each grant available?
- You do not have to complete separate applications for each grant for the Diocese of Lansing. Please contact your school directly for information on their financial assistance available.
- What if I do not have access to a computer, and cannot complete the form online?
- Many schools will let you use a computer in their library; please contact your school directly for more information.
- I can complete the form online but I cannot upload or scan the documents, what do I do?
- Many schools can help you upload the document. Contact your school office for more information.
- When will I know if I qualified for any financial assistance?
- You will receive letters by May 30 from the Diocese of Lansing, notifying you of your determination and amount of financial assistance. If you qualified for a grant, your school will also be notified of the grant and the amount.
- I did not qualify for any financial assistance from the Diocese of Lansing, is there anything I can do to receive financial assistance.
- If it was determined that you did not show a financial need, and you still require financial assistance. You can contact your school directly for assistance. *There is no appeal process for the Diocese of Lansing grants.*
